Bismarck-Burleigh Public Health (BBPH) Update

Facebook Live Launched from Department Operations Center/Emergency Operations Center March 30th with Renae Moch, Bismarck-Burleigh Public Health Director, and Jason Tomanek, City of Bismarck Assistant Administrator, providing COVID-19 information through BBPH’s Facebook page. There are now 147 positive COVID-19 cases in the state of North Dakota, with 21 of those added today. Of those 21 new cases, **2 were in Burleigh County for a total of 32 positive cases in Burleigh County**. Twenty-six individuals are hospitalized throughout the state.

As of April 1, 2020, Burleigh County has the second-highest number of cases in the state of North Dakota.

Coronavirus Cases






Positive Cases: Number of individuals who test positive for COVID-19 from state and private labs.

Recovered: Number of cases who tested positive and have since been released from isolation and are no longer contagious.

Trending Curve




Confirmed Positive Cases by County



Due to the increase in positive cases in our area, the state has reached out to Bismarck-Burleigh Public Health (BBPH) to assist with contact tracing for these individuals. BBPH staff will continue to conduct contact tracing.

Individuals identified as close contacts of someone testing positive with COVID-19 will receive a phone call from the North Dakota Department of Health or the local public health department. You will then be provided with the appropriate steps to take next. Additionally, if a school or daycare is involved, letters will be sent to all parents. For more information visit



Case Investigation

- › We have been assisting the NDDOH with contact investigation & tracing for positive COVID-19 cases
- › Nurses walk the positive case through the last 14 days of their life
- › They ask where they've been and who they have been in close contact with and gather names and phone numbers
- › Close contact is considered contact within 6 ft for 10-15 minutes



- **Steps to take to avoid the spread of COVID-19**
 - Stay home if you're sick.
 - Practice good hygiene: wash your hands, avoid touching your face and cover coughs and sneezes.
 - If someone in the household has tested positive for coronavirus, keep the entire household at home.
 - Older individuals and those with underlying health conditions should stay away from other people.
 - Work from home when possible.
 - Avoid discretionary travel, shopping trips and social visits. Use take-out and delivery services.

- **What to do if you have symptoms:**
 - Individuals who think they may have COVID-19 but have minor symptoms should **self-isolate at home**.
 - Individuals seeking medical attention should call before they go in.
 - Symptoms of COVID-19 in people who have been exposed can include fever, cough and shortness of breath.
 - The symptoms may appear in as few as two days or as long as 14 days after exposure.
 - For questions related to COVID-19, the public can call the ND Department of Health hotline at 1-866-207-2880 from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., 7 days a week. Individuals who need medical advice should contact their health care provider.

Many cities are creating curbside pickup zones to assist customers and businesses connecting in a safe way. McQuade Distributing has generously printed the signage for these zones to help customers and businesses connect a curbside purchase. - Bismarck Public Works asks residents to bag their garbage. The city is committed to providing garbage collection service through these unforeseen circumstances and ever-changing pandemic. We are also committed to protecting our employee's health to ensure garbage collection continues to be a service, and we are requesting some assistance from the public.
 - Please make sure all garbage is bagged, inside and outside the container. If it is outside the garbage container and not bagged, it will not be picked up. Tree branches will be picked up, but they need to be bundled in 4-foot sections, and able to be picked up by one person.
 - Bismarck Public Works appreciates the cooperation to keep our staff safe, and to ensure that garbage collection remains as a service to the community. We also remind citizens that the landfill will be open Monday-Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for any refuse items that cannot be bagged. For more information visit www.bismarcknd.gov.
- Building Inspections Services Division has developed procedures in response to COVID-19. In an effort to reduce exposure and to protect the general public and our city employees, inspections will be suspended for all projects where access to an occupied dwelling unit is required. We are working hard to continue to provide inspections services during this unprecedented time and appreciate everyone's flexibility while we prioritize lower risk locations such as new residential and commercial projects, including healthcare facilities and critical infrastructure. Other

- Governor Burgum today announced that President Donald Trump has granted the governor’s request for a major presidential disaster declaration to make federal assistance available to support North Dakota’s response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The declaration makes federal funding available to state, tribal and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations for emergency protective measures, including direct federal assistance. - Governor Burgum today signed an [executive order](#) waiving the mandatory one-week waiting period for unemployment benefits as claims continue to increase in North Dakota during the COVID-19 pandemic. Learn more details [here](#).
- Governor Burgum extended the [executive order](#) for closures from April 6 to April 20. This includes state facilities, restaurants (other than take out or delivery) personal care services and more.
- State Health Officer Mylynn Tufte signed a [confinement order](#) directing individuals to quarantine for 14 days if traveling back to North Dakota from all international locations and states in the U.S. classified as having widespread disease by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. - The Burleigh County Courthouse is restricting public access due to COVID-19. - Effective March 23, 2020, Bis-Man Transit restricted public access to its facility and implemented changes to Capital Area Transit (fixed-route) and Paratransit service until further notice. Call 701-258-6817 or visit <https://bismantransit.com/> for more information.
